The Island government is looking into marking July 1 as an official holiday in the future.

Wilhelmina Park was the location where slaves were sold before the abolition of slavery in the Dutch Kingdom on July 1, 1863. Stakeholders, such as the Agriculture Department, Tourism Department and others, wanted to beautify the Park in planting trees, but cooperation was not forthcoming.

Hotel occupancy in Curação down

WILLEMSTAD--The Curação Hotel and Tourism Associa-tion CHATA has been evaluating the hotel performance on the island for the last couple of months and recently revealed the result during its membership meeting. CHATA is concerned and some experts might even say that this is "Code Red" for the local sector.

Curação is seeing a rise in non-traditional accommodations and changes in travel behaviour.

The May figures for Curação derived from the CHATA re-

port is a compilation of 14 properties, representing a combined 2,220 rooms. In total Curação counts about 3,000 hotel rooms, which does not include apartments and villas.

An analysis for the month of May showed an average occupancy of 54.1 per cent compared to 65.1 per cent the same month in 2015. The Average Daily Rate (ADR) dropped from US \$139.27 to \$131.02.

At \$70.91 in May 2016, the Revenue per Available Room RevPAR has decreased by \$19.75 compared to the year be-

"Overall we have seen a decrease every month for the first five months of 2016, in hotel performance. We have seen a drop of about two percent each month leading up to the month of May, where we recorded a decline of almost 11 per cent," said CHATA.

Occupancy has actually dropped for most Caribbean Islands except St. Lucia, which recorded an increase compared to May 2015. As for the ADR, Trinidad & Tobago, St. Lucia, Cancun, Barbados, and Turks & Caicos Islands saw an increase compared to May 2015.

While the RevPAR was down for most islands, St. Lucia, Barbados, Turks & Caicos and the Dominican Republic did see an increase compared to May 2015.

According to CHATA and the Caribbean Hotel & Tourism Association (CHTA), the factors contributing to a decrease in hotel performance in the region include a mild US winter, uncertainty in the global economy, US elections, the Zika virus, the "Sharing Economy" (rise of apartments), as well economic and political situations in Brazil and Canada.

What contributed positively to arrivals was the increase in travel from the European markets and intra-regional traffic.

CHATA discussed the situation with key stakeholders including the Curaçao Tourist Bureau (CTB) and Curaçao Airport Partners (CAP) to determine possible strategies to drive more business towards local hotels. "In partnership with our industry partners, several campaigns will be implemented in the different markets to stimulate demand," the report stated.

CHATA expects a similar trend for the month of June 2016. and hopes that the summer will pick up again with additional business for the hotel industry.
