Expertise Centre wraps up reading programme

ST. EUSTATIUS--Expertise Centre St. Eustatius ECE last week wrapped up its three-month reading programme in English and Dutch for children of the various elementary schools on the island.

The programme, which was held at Gertrude Judson Public Library, was coordinated by ECE's remedial teacher Ykerna Rivers. Volunteers such as Edrienna Brandao, Mia van Deelen, Danica Amajan, Rijziena Hooker, Geertruida Goldenhuis, Visalia Lopes and Kathy Werneker engaged the children in Dutch and English reading twice per week for an hour each. The reading programme was geared toward helping children improve their reading skills. Volunteers assisted the children with letter sounds. word pronunciation, reading comprehension and fluency. The volunteers also kept a record of the children's progress

"Word games such as pop-for-sight words, scrabble and word memory were among the games played during the reading programme to help the children learn new words and practice pronunciation skills in a fun way," Rivers said.

On the last day of the reading programme the children were free to play games or read with their parents. Drinks and snacks were served, after which the children received their certificate of participation.

PLP and UPC start formation process

ST. EUSTATIUS--Formateur and leader of Progressive Labour Party (PLP) Clyde van Putten presented a copy of the so-called Lampeweg Accord Monday afternoon at the Governor's Office. In the signed document PLP and United People's Coalition (UPC) agreed to start the formation of a new island government after last week's Island Council election.

Van Putten presented the signed document with the subtitle "Giving government back to the people" to Island Governor Gerald Berkel in the conference room on Monday afternoon.

In the signed letter of intent PLP and UPC declared their willingness to start negotiations to form the next island government with regard to the outcome of the March 18 election and the "commonality of goals and interests" of both parties.

PLP and UPC agree that the interest of the people of Statia will be the guiding principle of these negotiations.

"Cardinal to all discussions and negotiations will be the desire of the people of Statia to have stability in government and to have a government that is accountable to its people at all times. The people of St. Eustatius deserve a government they can trust. All negotiations will be done in good faith and with the goal to restore the trust of our people in the government.

"All other terms and conditions of the proposed agreement will be negotiated, agreed upon and stated in the final document of the governing accord," it was written in the document.

The letter of intent was sent by party presidents Brenda van Putten (PLP) and Derrick Simmons Jr. (UPC) and by UPC leader Reginald Zaandam as well as van Putten.

Formateur van Putten addressed the public Monday evening in a live broadcast on local radio and television. He said the new Executive Council is to consist of UPC Commissioner Reginald Zaandam and of Astrid McKenzie-Tatem on behalf of PLP. They will be supported in the Island Council by Van Putten and PLP newcomer Richeline Leerdam and by Reuben Merkman on behalf of UPC.
